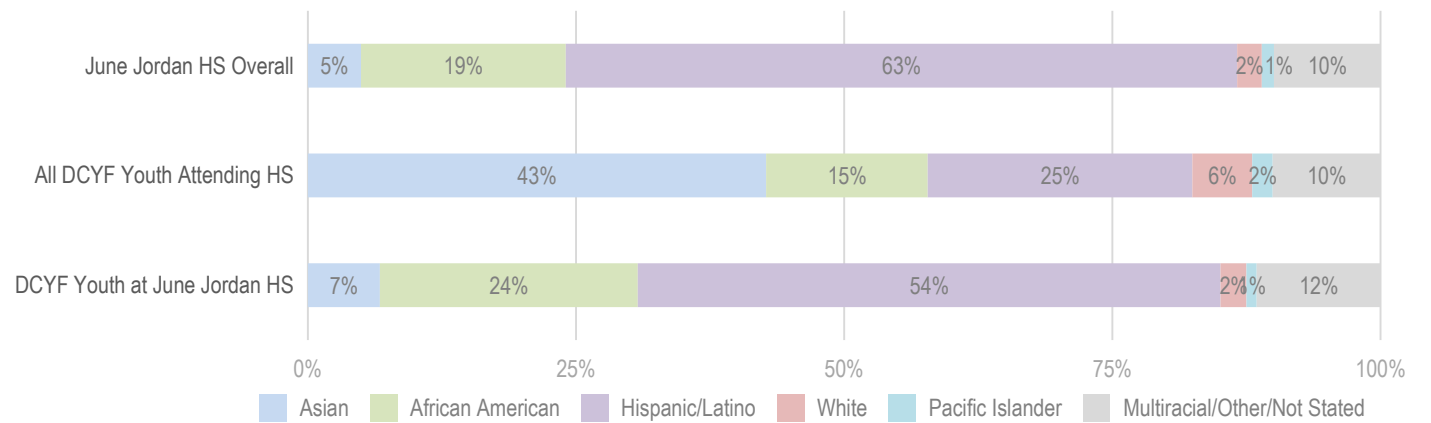

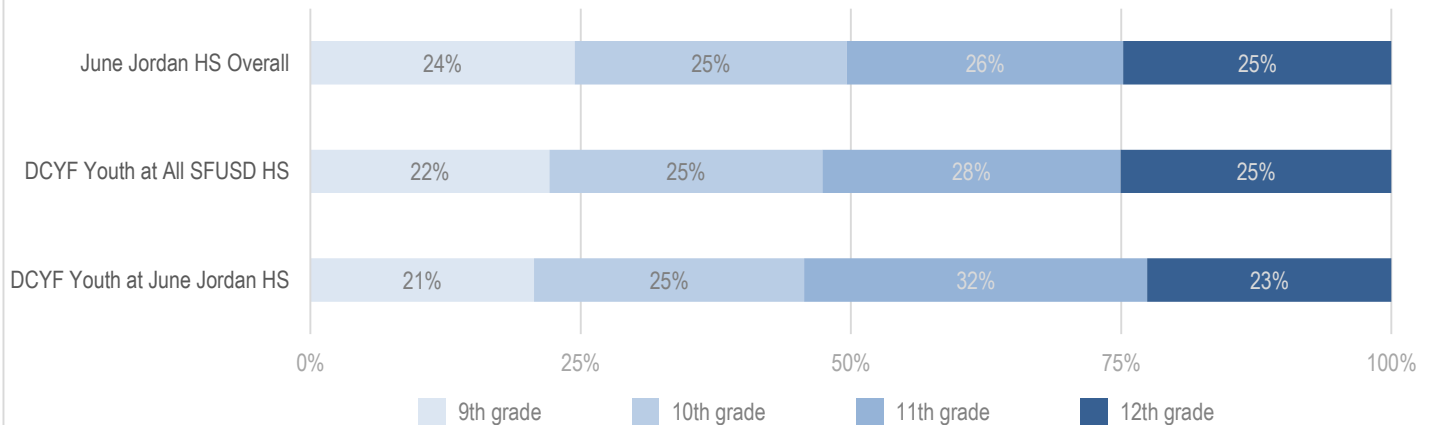
- **262** students were enrolled at June Jordan High School during the 2014-15 school year.

Grade Levels of Youth at June Jordan HS



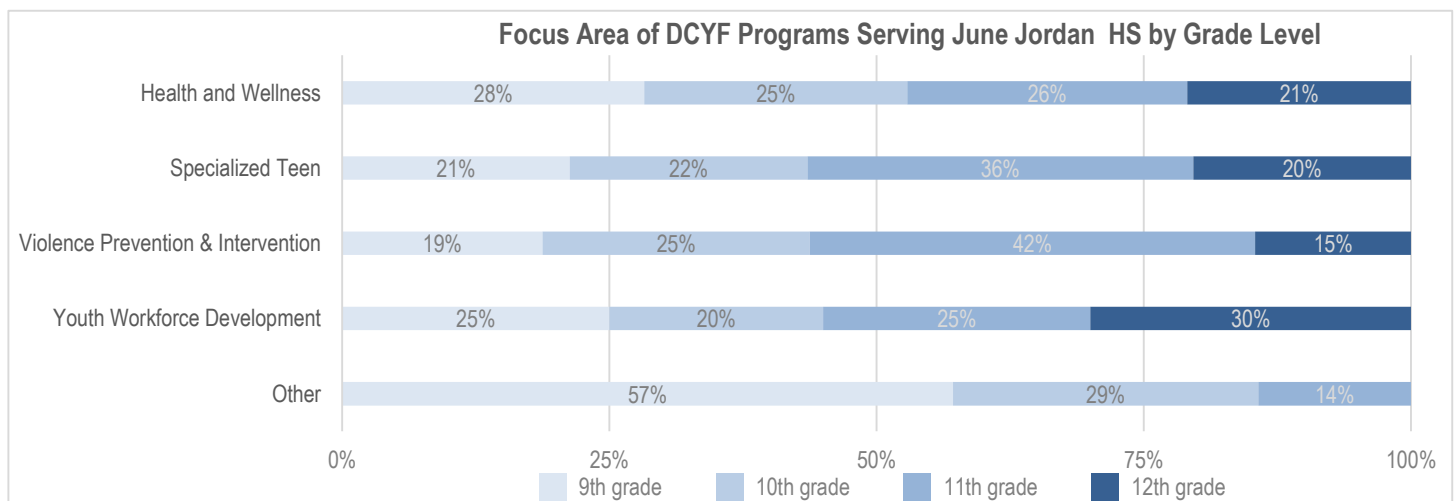
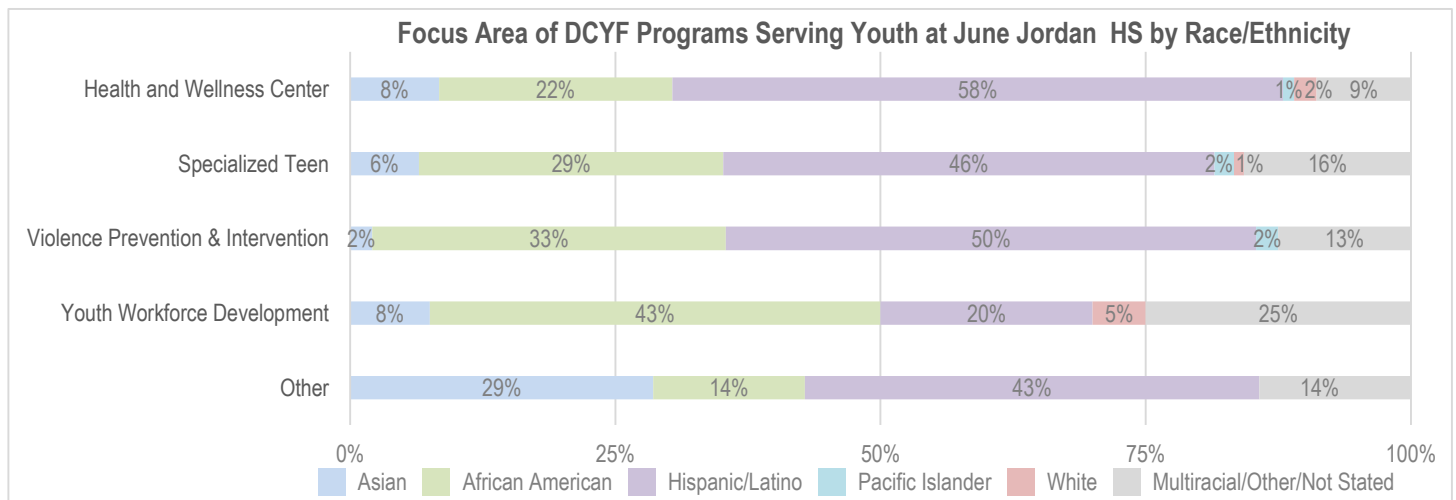

Focus Areas of DCYF Programs

- **Health and Wellness** centers provide health, mental health, substance abuse counseling, and referrals. Onsite experts in adolescent health help teens gain the skills they need to cope with stress, trauma, suicide, bullying, depression, self-esteem, drug and alcohol abuse, sexual health, and relationships.
- **Specialized Teen** programs provide structured activities and experiences that help teens obtain social, emotional, ethical, physical, and cognitive competencies. Programs may focus on a particular population such as new immigrants or topics such as creative writing.
- **Violence Prevention & Intervention** programs provide services for system involved youth and youth engaged in high-risk behavior. Programs focus on preventing behavior that can lead to arrest, supporting youth after arrest, and providing reentry/transition and aftercare services for system involved youth.
- **Youth Workforce Development** programs provide early work experience and help prepare youth for educational and career success. Programs provide career awareness, job coaching, job search help, and job placements.
